From Interstate-5 South

Take I-5 south towards Seattle to Exit 177 (WA-104) towards Edmonds/Lake Forest Park. After exiting the highway, turn left onto 205th St/WA-104. Travel under the interstate and immediately get in to the far left lane (separated by the median). Turn left at the traffic light onto 244th St. SW. Use the 2nd to the left turn lane and turn left onto Van Ry Blvd. Take the first right into the large parking lot and the clinic will be directly in front of you. If you reach Terrace Station you have gone too far!

From Interstate-5 North

Take I-5 north towards Lynnwood to Exit 178 for 236th St SW Mountlake Terrace. Exit and keep in the right lane and turn right onto 236th St SW. Take an immediate right onto Van Ry Blvd. Follow Van Ry Blvd. for 0.6 miles and turn left into a large parking lot across from the Grocery Outlet/Cinobar entrance. If you reach the light at 244th St SW you have gone too far!

Ophthalmic Procedures

- Intraocular prosthesis surgery
- Diamond burr debridement for indolent ulcers
